

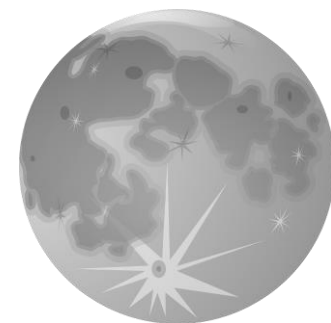

a/an

- Used for objects that are not specific or one of several things of a similar type.
e.g.: I need a phone.
- Used the first time we introduce an object.
e.g.: I saw a movie last night.
- A: is used in front of singular countable nouns which are not specific. If a noun starts with a consonant sound (b, c, d, f, g, h, j, k, etc.) "a" comes before the noun.
e.g.: a dog
- An: is used in front of singular countable nouns which are not specific. If a noun starts with a vowel sound (a, e, I, o, u), "an" comes before the noun.
e.g.: an image

the

- Used for specific objects or objects that both the speaker and listener know.
e.g.: can you give me the books from the table?
- Used when we mention the object again.
e.g. the movie is based on a real-life incident.
- We use "the" in front of all nouns to describe someone or something specific or unique.
e.g.: the Moon, the Sun, the world etc.
