a/an

O Used for objects that are not specific or one of several things of a similar type.

e.g.: I need a phone.

- O Used the first time we introduce an object.
 - eg I saw a movie last night.
- A: is used in front of singular countable nouns which are not specific. If a noun starts with a consonant sound (b,c,d,f,g,h,j,k,etc.) "a" comes before the noun.

eg a dog

O An: is used in front of singular countable nouns which are not specific. If a noun starts with a vowel sound (a, e, I, o, u), "an" comes before the noun.

eg an mage

the

O Used for specific objects or objects that both the speaker and listener know.

eg can you give me the books from the table?

- O Used when we mention the object again.
 eg. the movie is based on a real-life incident.
- O We use "the" in front of all nouns to describe someone or something specific or unique.

e.g.: the Moon, the Sun, the world etc.
